Dear Friends,

Below you will find a letter of testimony from one of the teachers at the school we help support. Although both English and Swahili are official languages in Uganda, there are 43 indigenous languages which are commonly spoken, so her writing may seem awkward to us at times. In addition, until 1962 Uganda was a colony of Great Britain, so British spelling is often used.

Family names are also different from the way we are used to. When a couple gets married, the woman does not change her name. Any children born are given a Ugandan name of a cherished relative or family friend, as well as an English sounding name, which is often but not always from the Bible.

It is also very common for children to live apart from their parents with other family members in order to attend school. Many times husbands and wives live apart due to work.

When she refers to F.O.K. she is of course talking about Friends Of Kibbuse, our organization here in the United States. St. James KVTC is St. James Kibbuse Vocational Technical Centre, the name of the school.

Thank you for your continued support and prayers. We are working hard to raise money for a new dormitory so that all students may return while the school keeps COVID safety regulations.
